HOLY WEEK

April 13—Palm Sunday (10:00 am Worship)

On the Sunday before His Death, Jesus sent two Disciples ahead, having them find and bring a donkey and its unbroken colt back to Him. Jesus sat on the young donkey and made His triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The crowds welcomed Him by waving palm branches in the air. See page three for information about the Palm Sunday potluck.

April 17—Maundy Thursday (7:00 pm Service)


Jesus shared the feast of the Passover with His disciples. The Last Supper established Communion, sharing in the elements of bread and wine in remembrance of Jesus' sacrifice. Later, Jesus went to the garden of Gethsemane and prayed in agony to God the Father. It was in the garden that Jesus was betrayed with a kiss by Judas Iscariot and arrested.

April 18—Good Friday (Online Only)

Jesus was wrongly sentenced to death by crucifixion. Soldiers pierced Him with a crown of thorns. Jesus then carried his own cross to Calvary where he was mocked and insulted as he was nailed to the wooden cross. After many hours, Jesus breathed His last breath and died. By dying on the cross, Jesus paid for the sins of all people. The youth will be recording a service. It will be on our YouTube channel.

April 20—Easter Sunday (10:00 am Worship)

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the most important event of Christian faith. Early Sunday morning, several women went to the tomb and discovered that the large stone covering the entrance had been rolled away. An angel announced Jesus' resurrection. Pastor's Reflections

Recently the church received a bulletin from November 22, 1925. (1) The older bulletin was from our congregation. In this bulletin, you can find a treasure trove of historical information like how there were only eight presbyteries in the entire country. One can sense the importance of evangelism as the "need of the Gospel" is mentioned. The congregation was asked to pray for missionaries in Siam. The bulletin lists out the schedule for the week which is still included in today's bulletins. For those interested, Rev. Harold Baldwin was the pastor at this time while the Rev. E.V. Campbell was the Pastor Emeritus.

As I was reading this fascinating bulletin, I was reminded of how similar our bulletin is. There were traditional announcements, an order for worship (morning and evening), several requests of the congregation and scriptures that shaped the day.

As we approach this Holy Week we will read and reflect upon some of the same scriptures that shaped the people of this place in the 1920's. We do it every year. We begin Holy Week with palms and a procession. We move to the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday and conclude that night with a service of Tenebrae (Latin for darkness). On Good Friday, we'll share the texts again that highlight the passion and death of Jesus. On Easter, we'll celebrate the resurrection in unique and traditional ways.

When we gather for worship, we gather with the saints who have gone before us and the scriptures that celebrate a God who has overcome death for all time. This Holy Week I hope you will ponder the selected texts for each day and join us for the events that make this week a special reminder of God's love for us. Just like the people of the 1920's, we will utter those familiar and celebratory words, "He is risen. He is risen, indeed."

The grace and peace of Christ be with you.

Book of Order 2023-2025

G-2.02 DEACONS: THE MINISTRY OF COMPASSION AND SERVICE

G-2:0201 Deacon Defined

The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture " is one of compassion, witness and service sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress." Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgement should be chosen for this ministry.

G-2.0202 Under Authority of the Session

Deacons may be individually commissioned or organized as a board of deacons. In either case, their ministry is under the supervision and authority of the session. Deacons may also be given special assignments in the congregation, such as caring for members in need, handling educational tasks, cultivating liberality in giving, collecting and disbursing monies to specific persons or causes, or overseeing the buildings and property of the congregation. Deacons shall assume other duties as may be delegated to them by the session, including assisting with the Lord's Supper (W-3.0414) A congregation majority vote may choose not to utilize the ordered ministry of deacons. If the congregation has neither a board of deacons nor individually commissioned deacons, the function of this ordered ministry shall be the responsibility of the ruling elders and the session.



NAPS Update

NAPS (Nutritional Assistance Program for Seniors) is a program of the US Department of Agriculture, run through Second Harvest Heartland. This program offers seniors 60 and over a 45-pound box of non-perishable food and 2 pounds of cheese each month. As of March 1st, the program guidelines have been updated and the income requirements have been increased.

To be eligible for the NAPS program, a client must be 60 years of age. In addition, the client must meet the following income requirements:

Household of 1 \$1,957 per month or \$23,475 annually Household of 2 \$2,644 per month of \$31,725 annually

If a client is above these income requirements, they may still be eligible. If a client is participating in the SNAP program, SSI, or Medicaid, they would qualify for the NAPS program (without meeting the income requirements). With a household of two, each member would be eligible for a box of food and cheese

Expenses such as groceries, utilities, etc. continue to increase in cost. If you know of a family member, friend or neighbor who may qualify for NAPS, please have them apply by calling Second Harvest Heartland at 651-401-1411. They can also contact me at 320 -223-1059. Once paperwork is completed, the client is eligible for 3 years.
