

Pastor's Reflections

The St. Cloud Rotary Club I belong to recently celebrated its 100th anniversary. We reminisced about our experiences over the last several years. We rejoiced with long-time members and the service that the club has accomplished. The club was instrumental in the Lake George renovations, helped organize Pathways 4 Youth, and still partners with ISD 742 to provide preschool for many in need (Preschool for Success). Those are just a few of the things the club has worked on. We laughed at the stories and mourned those who were no longer with us. We reveled that we have one member of the club who is a fourthgeneration member. We cherished the time we had around the tables and knew it was a holy time together.

I couldn't help but think about the parallels between the church and this Rotary Club. We share many of the same opportunities and challenges. We sing when we gather. 

I really enjoyed the one year I went to Clearwater Forest and waiting until my senior year to go is one of my biggest regrets. It's a beautiful place that speaks to my soul.

What are some small things that brighten your day?

Small things that brighten my day: hugs from students or their shared accomplishments; the sun shining bright; seeing an owl design of any kind; my beloved daily Bubbl'r drink; greetings from loved ones; getting a letter in the mail.

Springtime brings warmer weather and the desire to get outside and start doing "something." For golfers that means "hitting the links." Fisherman prepare to "wet the line." For gardeners the plan is "to plant a seed." I like to imagine myself to be a gardener, but possibly I fall more into the category of plant experimenter. You know, pushing the growing zone and to go where no man (or woman) has gone before.

This year is the canary melon. Sharon purchased this yellow fruit two years ago and we saved the seeds. I planted seed two years ago and ended up with a fruit that would not turn yellow-no matter what I tried. Turns out we also saved acorn squash seeds that year! At any rate, this year, I planted about 8 seeds and two sprouted! One survived. We will see if we get yellow canary melons this year-or something else.



Home Delivered Communion

We are in need of additional volunteers for Home Delivered Communion. If you're interested but have never participated in this mission, training will be available. How does it work?

Once each month volunteers provide their availability for delivering home communion. Then a team of two volunteers is assigned for each homebound person who requests communion. Visits may occur soon after our church service on Sunday morning, or Sunday afternoon, or at a time during the week that is agreed upon by the participants.

The visit begins with a brief time of chatting and learning about each other, if not already familiar, and finding out if there are any needs or concerns. Volunteers are provided with a communion service liturgy that is followed during the communion service. The entire visit usually lasts 20-30 minutes.

A wonderful benefit of Home Delivered Communion is the fellowship that occurs during the visits. Communion recipients and servers engage in conversation and share news from the church and community. Through this simple Mission we all grow together in the love of Christ.




Celebration of Life for Tom Addicott
