Pastor's Reflections

Why doesn't the Presbyterian church do altar calls? I was asked this question by someone new to our church. This individual came from a tradition where altar calls were a regular practice of their worship experience.

Presbyterians don't have altars. An "altar" is usually understood to refer to a raised structure on which sacrifices are offered, or incense is burned in worship. The word "altar" first appears in the Bible in Genesis 8:20. Presbyterians believe that Christ's sacrifice on the cross brought an end to any kind of ceremonial sacrificial system. So, first and foremost our tradition does not have altars in the church. Instead, we utilize communion tables which point to the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The practice of altar calls – calling people forward after a sermon to make a public confession of faith – gained prominence in the 20th century primarily through the evangelistic ministry of Rev. Billy Graham and others. The altar call itself is not biblical. Nowhere in the Bible does anyone come forward during a worship gathering. Yes, Jesus invited people to follow him but it does not appear that this invitation was based in a worship setting.

Some believe the altar call can be a manipulative practice preying on people's emotions. Others believe it is a faithful way of responding to the gospel. In our tradition, we practice an "Invitation to Discipleship" where individuals can decide on their own what they believe and how they can best demonstrate their faith. This invitation is offered in a variety of ways through the sermon, a prayer, and by inviting people forward after the worship service. I contend the entire worship service is an invitation to respond to the grace of God.

The grace and peace of Christ be with you.

At February G.I.F.T. Sunday, we created our own decorative signs and cherished fun fellowship across generations!











If you could have been a cast member of any TV show past or present, which one would you pick to be on, and why?


Happy Days. One of my all-time favorites. I liked that it was set back in the 50's and it was a good wholesome comedy.


Given the choice of anyone in the world past or present, whom would you enjoy as a dinner guest and why?

Stewardship Update



Capital Loan Status

Thank you for your generosity. We have completed our third campaign and all pledges have been completed. We had several families that remembered our church with memorials for a loved one. Thank you. In 2024 we were able to lower our principal balance by \$62,000. We looked at various options for reducing our loan. We decided to not run another campaign at this time. Our hope is that our members will continue to support this program without running another campaign. If you are able to continue donating to the capital project, we appreciate it. Any size gift is appreciated.

We signed the PCUSA loan in first quarter 2016. Our original capital loan balances were: \$450,000 on the PCUSA loan and \$162,225 line of credit at UBS. The total loans were \$612,225. The UBS line of credit has been paid off. With our current cash on hand, we can make capital payments through first quarter of 2026. At that time, we should have approximately \$100,000 principal left on the loan.

This means we have paid off 85% of our loans in the last 5 years. This is amazing! If everyone works together, we can lower this balance another \$40,00 or 50,000 in 2025 (above the current cash balance). We are getting so close to our goal of being debt free by the end of 2026.

Sanctuary Windows Update

Thank you to everyone that has supported this project. Our church family has been very generous in your gifts. The six east side windows were completed last summer. We plan to do the remaining five windows this spring/summer. We are short \$6,500 to complete the project. If you are able to contribute a small amount, it would be helpful. Again, THANK YOU for your support.
