

Pastor's Reflections

Recently, I was at an event where the people sitting at my table were discussing their family of origin stories. "I don't drink alcohol because my father was a raging alcoholic." His father's alcoholism impacted his childhood greatly. Another member commented that her mother was addicted to various painkillers. Their family was torn apart by her mother's addiction. I sat there thinking about the brokenness of the world. I was reminded of the hymn lyric from A Mighty Fortress Is Our God, "And though this world, with devils filled, should threaten to undo us, we will not fear, for God hath willed His truth to triumph through us."

Each year during Advent and Christmas, we proclaim the familiar words, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Theologians refer to it as the incarnation. The doctrine of the incarnation is the belief that the second person of the Trinity became a human being and assumed flesh in Jesus Christ. But, it is more than a doctrine. It is a reminder that God's love is not distant but close and personal. God does not save us from afar but enters our world with all its beauty and brokenness.

This mystery of the incarnation also calls us to a new way of life. As God comes near to us in Christ, we are sent to draw near to one another. We do so with compassion and courage. In a world that often keeps its distance, the incarnation empowers us to

embody God's love with our hands, our words, our presence. (1)

During Advent and Christmas we don't focus on the limitations of this world. We properly think about the idea that God has broken into the world. We sing about it. We long for it. We wait.

Grace and peace to you this Advent and Christmas.

Deacon's Corner

In 1974, 42-year-old Charles was sent to prison in Alabama. Charles was not a career criminal. In fact, he was a well-respected attorney. No, Charles did not start life out as a criminal.

Charles was born in 1931 in Boston. As a child, he witnessed the charitable works of his parents. His mother cooked meals for the hungry during the Depression and his father donated his legal services to the United Prison Association of New England.

During World War II, young Charles organized fund-raising campaigns in his school that raised enough money to buy a Jeep for the army. Charles went on to serve in the US Marine Corps during the Korean War. Following his military service he founded his own law firm.

In 1968 Charles left his law firm to serve a counsel to presidential candidate, Richard Nixon. In 1969 he was appointed Special Counsel to the new President Nixon. It was during this time that things changed for Charles. He was described by others as a "hard man, the 'evil genius' of an evil administration." Charles himself stated that he was "willing...to be ruthless in getting things done."

Finally, on March 1, 1974, Charles was indicted for conspiring to cover up the Watergate burglaries. As he was facing arrest, a close friend gave him a copy of Mere Christianity by C. S. Lewis. After reading it, Charles became an evangelical Christian. After prayer and consultation with his fellowship group, Charles decided to plead guilty to the charge of obstructing justice and was sentenced to 1-3 years in prison.

After his release from prison, Charles founded "Prison Fellowship" which is today the nations largest outreach to prisoners, ex-prisoners and their families. It is this organization that created the "Angel Tree Christmas" that churches across the country support to provide gifts for the children of incarcerated parents. Through this program children and their families know that they are not forgotten, that their mom or dad still loves them, even though they are separated by prison walls.

When you take a tag from our Angel Tree this year, remember Charles "Chuck" Colson, President Richard Nixon's "hatchet man" who was saved by Christ and led by the Holy Spirit to start this outreach.

Now, in the words of the last radio announcer, Paul Harvey, "You know the rest of the story."
