Pastor's Reflections

How well do we equip the saints for the work of ministry? As a pastor I see evidence that we do this quite well at times. We have committees that distribute work and equip people for service. These committees, and their leadership, understand the need for many people to join in the ministry and equip others to support them in faithful ministry. At other times I sense that some folks are a bit self-seeking. "If it is to be, it is up to me" is their mantra. These are the kind of folk who take ownership of their ministry and don't allow others to step up and help.

At the January Session meeting we reviewed the characteristics and qualities that make for a good elder. They included but are not limited to: faithful prayer, openness to the Scriptures, collaboration, and a willingness to listen to the voice of the Spirit and colleagues in ministry. There were many others that were mentioned.

I continue to pray for an understanding of ministry that includes all the servants in the church and that the church would be receptive to others and their gifts for ministry. How can we best accomplish the task of equipping others for ministry?

We can do this by identifying people who have gifts for a particular ministry. We can encourage their creativity and commitment to Jesus Christ. We can encourage their ideas and their insights for ministry.

We can do this by inviting others to join us. Ministry ordinarily begins with an invitation. "How would you like to help with the Friday event?" In fact, discipleship begins with an invitation. Jesus invited his followers to "come and see" what was happening.

We can do this by praying for our church. We can pray for more workers to accomplish the tasks of ministry. We can pray that all of us understand the need for people to serve willingly.

I like how Lillian Daniel put it in a writing she crafted for a book entitled, "This Odd and Wondrous Calling." She wrote about her daughter's elementary school musical. The program read, "This musical was originally written for 15 actors, but it has been adapted to accommodate our cast of 206. She goes on to write: We are called to be like the volunteer geniuses behind the elementary school musical that took a play with 15 parts and creatively made room for 206.

We take a few loaves and fishes and feed thousands, at the church potluck or at the homeless shelter. We take a task we could simply pay someone to do, and we divide it into fifteen parts so that everyone has a job. Is it efficient? No. Not if all you care about is getting the job done.

But in the church we should care less about getting the job done and more about the people doing it. We are not in the

Valentine's Day (Feb. 14)

The history of Valentine's Day—and the story of its patron saint—is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The Roman Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Still others insist that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was the true namesake of the holiday. He, too, was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement.

Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic and—most importantly—romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is always 46 days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation



in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection.

Sohail Aslam Visit

Rescheduled: On Sunday, Feb. 23, 2025, we welcome Sohail Aslam from First Presbyterian Church in Springfield, IL to give us a brief introduction to Pakistan Christian Outreach Foundation, a 501c3 organization in the U.S. which has projects in various areas of health, education. In addition to the brief introduction during our service, we will have a reception in the library after church for further conversation about the United Christian Hospital and Nursing School.

Our local mission committee has focused on the United Christian Hospital and Nursing School in Lahore, Pakistan. We have contributed money to the complete renovation of the kitchen, dining, and washing areas of the nursing school which are in dire need of upgrades. By upgrading and renovating the facilities, the goal is to enhance the education and training provided to nursing students. This will involve improving the infrastructure, acquiring necessary equipment, and ultimately offering a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree.5



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Stewardship Update

The members of our church family are very generous with their time, talents, and tithes. Because of your generosity, 2024 was an unexpectedly strong year for our operating budget. Income was \$369,793 -- \$31,403 more than anticipated.

The primary factors were non-pledge giving (+\$24,219) and pledged giving (+\$14,342). (We often fall slightly short of budget; individual circumstances change, members move or pass away.). Operating expenses were \$356,313 -- \$11,341 under budget. Major factors: Utility bills more than \$10,000 lower with an unusually mild winter and an unfilled Christian education coordinator position.

As a congregation we will have more projects going into the future. With careful prudent planning and God's help we will be able to meet our obligations. We are excited to see where God leads us. We are truly blessed with a generous and active congregation. Our people give of their time, talents, and treasures in very charitable, unselfish, and kind-hearted ways. All of this is possible through the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and your generosity.
